Dear CFHI Family,

This year, in deep alignment with my founding vision of peace and equitable approaches to global health education work, CFHI launched our innovative Team Representatives on the Board Program. This initiative grew out of the belief that our organization is best served by formally including Global Team and Central Leadership Team representatives on its Board of Directors. The proposal grows out of CFHI's values, which stress the importance of participation and collaboration of longstanding leaders within our organization, and the belief that diverse perspectives strengthen the organization. We also believe that CFHI's team members should have a strong voice on the body whose decisions affect the conditions and nature of their work for the organization.

We were thrilled to welcome two new members for the inaugural year of this program, both of whom served conscientiously for their terms and helped steer CFHI effectively. The launch of this program dovetailed beautifully with our organization's thoughtful work to formally codify Fair Trade Learning principles for our field, specifically for Short-Term Global Health Experiences (STEGH).

This year we also had the honor of welcoming 698 learners to our in-person and virtual global health programs, from internships to electives, practicums, and more. Many of our participants with financial need received scholarships from CFHI. We maintain our deep-seated belief that thoughtful, ethical global health experiences are truly transformative; not only for individuals, but for health systems more broadly, as our participants return home with strong intercultural skills, deeper understanding of the determinants of health, and more nuanced expertise in health systems.

As one participant recently reflected: "Attending this program was critical for my personal and professional growth. It offered unparalleled opportunities to connect with experts in my field, engage in practical learning experiences, and collaborate with peers from diverse backgrounds. The knowledge and skills I gained have had a lasting impact on my career trajectory, equipping me with the tools and confidence to pursue new opportunities and contribute meaningfully to my community."

We're proud to continue this important work, pushing the boundaries of global health education to be ever-more aligned with our founding vision of peace and of equitable access to healthcare for all. Thank you for reading and supporting!

A MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD CHAIR



Dear CFHI Supporters,

2024 was a banner year for CFHI. We once again received the highest status rating, Platinum, from Candid (formerly GuideStar), and were awarded 2024 Top-Rated status for the 9th year in a row by Great Nonprofits. We continue to prioritize keeping our operational costs low, ensuring that at least 60% of every dollar we receive goes directly to our global leadership and host communities.

This year, we raised over \$200,000 through donations, more than twice the amount raised in the prior year. This represents exciting new momentum for CFHI, breathing added life into our scholarship fund and allowing us to subsidize program fees to keep them as accessible as possible while still ensuring Fair-Trade engagement with our global team and their community partners. I'm proud to share that through these efforts, we awarded \$52,220 in scholarship funds to over 30 recipients. We launched our innovative Off the Beaten Path scholarship program, supporting participants in experiencing transformative global health learning in rural and lesser-traveled program locations. We also worked closely with a dedicated alumni supporter to launch a customized Friends of the Philippines scholarship, which will offer full scholarships to at least six program participants in CFHI's Philippines-based program in 2025.

The world needs immersive, ethically sound global health education experiences now more than ever. We have been honored to welcome gifts and pledges in new forms this year: through named and dedicated scholarship funds that reflect the passion and commitments of our alumni; through estate planning and bequests; and by working with supporters to align with their Donor-Advised Funds. As students face ever-growing debt, we invite you to connect with us to explore how we can creatively foster hope for participants' futures through transformative global health opportunities.

Thank you for your ongoing support and trust in us.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR GLOBAL MEDICAL DIRECTOR



Dear CFHI Community,

CFHI's impacts continue to deepen and broaden. Through our three-part mission: programs, research, and thought leadership, CFHI influences diverse stakeholders including universities, faculty, students, parents, peer organizations, and professional bodies. Our commitment to thought leadership brings us into the orbits of many communities of practice.

CFHI's collaboration with the Consortium of Universities for Global Health (CUGH) has informed initiatives to strengthen competency-based global health education, including the [Global Health Education Competency Toolkit, 3rd Edition](#), the annual Reflection in Global Health contest, and resources from the Educational Products Sub-Committee. CFHI's contributions to the Community-Based Global Learning Collaborative have reignited conversations around Fair-Trade Learning (FTL), laying the groundwork for FTL frameworks to gain relevance and usability.

CFHI has brought key insights and standards to the Forum on Education Abroad and the National Association of International Educators (NAFSA), with a focus on health-related immersion and ethical practice. The American Association of Colleges and Universities (AAC&U) is a key partner in our Faculty Development Workshop (FDW), created for professors and staff supporting global health experiential learning. This workshop allows university teams to jointly explore the theory and practice of community-based learning in the border and Indigenous communities of southern Costa Rica. Our reach continues to grow as we seek new collaborations and avenues to influence the practice of global health experiential education. In this way, CFHI's impact is multifold—transforming the hearts and minds of our scholars and the wider global health education field.

When it comes to our CFHI scholars (the undergraduate, graduate, and post-graduate trainees who participate in CFHI international and virtual programs), we continue to innovate and expand. This year, CFHI launched an expanded medical student elective portfolio. Medical students can deepen their understanding of resource-conscious care and health systems strengthening by observationally embedding with surgical teams in Ghana, pediatric medicine in Bolivia, public health in India, and more. Through these electives, students grow their cross-cultural fluency, ability to serve diverse patient populations, and commitments to health equity.

For those medical students who cannot travel, our Virtual Global Health Elective is offered twice a year and welcomed students from 23 countries in 2024. CFHI provides full scholarships for students from low- and middle-income countries. In addition to course content, students reflect on the value of peer learning in an inclusive space, embodied by this alumni reflection: "The experience of interacting with students from diverse backgrounds broadened my understanding of global health, made the course more engaging, helped me connect with others, and highlighted the importance of global health ethics."

CFHI remains steadfast in our commitment to walking the talk of global health—equilibrating power imbalances, spotlighting the accomplishments of Low-and-Middle Income health systems, and nurturing cultural humility and adaptability. We are grateful to all the organizational partners who co-navigate this journey with us, and to the students and trainees who choose authentic ways of learning.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Dear CFHI Community,

This year, we were thrilled to bring a long-envisioned initiative to fruition: our Alumni Advisor Program. Peer mentorship is important in global education, and who better to fill this role than our own alumni? The Alumni Advisor Program adds a key layer of support for our program participants, especially those traveling internationally for the first time, those traditionally underrepresented in global education experiences, and those who have unique support needs during their programs. It embodies our commitment to seeking out new and innovative ways to support both our program participants and our Global Team during transformative global health education experiences with CFHI.

Drawing from an exceptional applicant pool and providing in-depth training for our Advisors, we launched the program with recently returned alumni assigned as advisors to CFHI participants throughout the 2024 year. Alumni were paired with incoming participants attending the same program country and site, allowing for meaningful and relevant guidance.

One Alumni Advisor shared:

"I enjoyed being able to connect with students (both those who are doing the program and those who are considering applying) and share everything about Cape Coast, Ghana that doesn't show up on paper! Giving people insight into how the program works and what Cape Coast is like—its environment, culture, safety, and opportunities to learn—led to many conversations about cultural humility and respect, and how to make the most of their program. It was amazing to represent CFHI and the Cape Coast program because it truly was life-changing, and there is no better way to help give others the excitement and knowledge to be prepared for their own learning abroad."

This thoughtful work paid off. A 2024 program alumnus reflected:

"My alumni advisor was AMAZING! She made me feel extremely comfortable prior to my trip and also did regular check-ins during my time in-country."

The Alumni Advisor Program is included in every place-based CFHI program at no extra cost. Alumni Advisors support participants in their preparation phase, conduct weekly check-ins during the program, and offer mentorship and virtual reflection sessions post-program. We are deeply grateful to our growing network of CFHI alumni, and especially to our Alumni Advisors, whose impact extends far beyond their own clinical or educational experiences, reaching and supporting new generations of CFHI participants.

We believe this program, alongside our broader and multi-dimensional efforts to support learners, our Global Team, and academic partners, is a key reason that in 2024 post-program evaluations, over 90% of CFHI participants said they would recommend CFHI to others, and 93% reported gaining a "greater capacity for cultural understanding in the healthcare field." Thank you for being here, and Let The World Change You!




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Innovative Support of Program Participants: CFHI's Alumni Advisor Program

Newly launched in 2024 to help CFHI program participants feel prepared and supported before, during, and after their global health education experience, the Alumni Advisor Program is comprised of exceptional CFHI alumni who share their experiences, expertise, and training with current participants. Each program features an Alumni Advisor who has completed the program in recent years, so they have detailed knowledge of program specifics, local cultural dynamics, and more.

Alumni Advisors meet virtually with participants before the program begins to help them prepare and to answer questions. After the program starts, Alumni Advisors conduct weekly check-ins via text or email and are available for calls and mentorship as needed. Finally, Alumni Advisors facilitate a virtual reflection session after the program concludes.

All Alumni Advisors complete an in-depth training offered by CFHI to ensure that they are well equipped to help participants derive meaningful learning, understanding, and reflection from their global health experience. The Alumni Advisor Program is included in every CFHI program at no additional cost to participants.



Connecting with a CFHI Alumni Advisor before the program was incredibly helpful. She shared honest insights, answered our questions, and made the experience feel less intimidating before we even arrived. It set a welcoming tone and helped me feel more prepared!"

Living our Values - Team Representatives on the Board Initiative

In December 2023, CFHI's Board of Directors unanimously voted to approve a new initiative that includes Global Team and Central Leadership Team representatives serving on the CFHI Board of Directors in rotating terms. This initiative emerged from CFHI's values, which emphasize the importance of participation and collaboration among longstanding leaders within our organization, as well as the belief that diverse perspectives strengthen CFHI. The Board also affirmed that CFHI team members should have a strong voice in the body that makes decisions affecting the conditions and nature of their work.

In 2024, CFHI's inaugural Team Representatives on the Board were Carlos Giavay Waiss, JD, CFHI Córdoba Program Director (Global Team), and Carolina Balaños Palmieri, Director of Programs (Central Leadership Team). They participated actively in all Board meetings and provided important input on organizational decisions and voting matters.



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Being part of the CFHI Board of Directors was a profoundly enriching experience. I had the opportunity to witness in person the dedication and hard work of each member of the central administration. Meeting face-to-face allowed us to establish a closer connection, strengthening mutual commitment and responsibility. Prioritizing Equitable Program Participation - The Virtual Global Health Elective

The CFHI Virtual Global Health Elective offers interprofessional trainees the opportunity to build knowledge in key global health competencies and learn from medical and public health professionals from across the world. In this virtual elective, students explore the concepts of planetary health, global health ethics, intersectoral global health, utilization of healthcare resources in low-resource settings, and community engagement in different country contexts. Participants also gain exposure to health challenges and strategies in specific regions. Throughout the program, participants develop skills in critical reflection, cross-cultural effectiveness and adaptability, and team collaboration.

Elective cohorts are made up of a majority of participants from low and middle income countries, with approximately 15 to 25 students per cycle. In 2024, students hailed from Nepal, Ethiopia, Egypt, India, Afghanistan, Pakistan, Kenya, Zambia, Uganda, Ecuador, the Philippines, Ghana, Nigeria, Vietnam, Peru, and more.



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The CFHI Virtual Global Health Elective has significantly enhanced my understanding of global health issues and practices. As a public health student, I wholeheartedly recommend this program to my peers and anyone interested in expanding their knowledge in this vital field. The curriculum is thoughtfully designed to provide valuable insights into the complexities of global health, fostering critical thinking and a deeper appreciation for diverse health systems around the world. Supporting Student Health, Wellness, and Safety

Health and safety remained a central priority throughout 2024. Key achievements included onboarding a new Assistant Director of Health and Safety in March and providing professional development opportunities for the global team, with a focus on mental health, wellbeing, and fostering a sense of belonging within programs. The team also contributed to the success of the OSAC Academia Sector Committee's Fall Seminar held in Oaxaca, Mexico. This seminar was a meaningful opportunity to showcase CFHI's programs in Mexico and CFHI's leadership in the field.



In addition, significant strides were made in strengthening CFHI's health and safety infrastructure. Notable improvements included the implementation of a new insurance policy for 2025 (which offers enhanced mental health support), the development of an updated Participation Agreement, and the adoption of CFHI Norms for participants, which more clearly articulate behavior expectations and shared agreements. Furthermore, new workflows and resources were put in place to ensure that students fully engage with their pre-departure training and arrive to their programs well prepared to have a successful on-site experience.

Preparing Public Health Professionals for the Future

The CFHI Practicum program offers Masters of Public Health and other students seeking formal capstone experiences through their universities with structured, mentored opportunities paired with CFHI's global leadership team and focusing on existing community priorities and initiatives. A total of 44 individuals completed their practicums across eight sites in 2024: 65 percent virtual, 31 percent in person, and 4 percent hybrid. The projects undertaken demonstrated both range and depth, as students collaborated closely with CFHI's local teams and partners.

One standout example was the practicum completed by Piper Kimble, an MPH student from The Pennsylvania State University, who worked with CFHI's Philippines team in June. Her project, titled Bridging the Immunization Gap: Policy Options for the Philippines, focused on exploring strategies to expand vaccination coverage, particularly for newer vaccines such as HPV and Rotavirus. Leveraging guidance from CFHI's leadership team in the Philippines, Piper developed a comprehensive proposal outlining two policy options that took into account financial and logistical challenges along with other key insights to inform policymakers. She shared that her practicum significantly shaped her career aspirations and ignited a strong interest in public health policy.

CFHI organized two Practicum Showcases in 2024. These virtual events brought together students, preceptors, and CFHI global teams to share experiences, present project outcomes, and reflect on lessons learned. Testimonials highlighted not only the wide range of work completed but also the value of mentorship within CFHI's practicum model.



This fellowship has been an extraordinary journey, offering me a unique platform to delve into the intricacies of global health, develop a diverse skill set, and make a tangible impact on my community. I was fortunate to learn from experts like Dr. Charles from Ghana, who was generous with his knowledge and experience. Their guidance helped me refine my research skills, develop strategic thinking, and enhance my leadership abilities. The workshops and seminars on various aspects of global health, from epidemiology to health policy, equipped me with a robust theoretical foundation and practical tools to tackle real-world health challenges. Interacting with other fellows from different countries enhanced my awareness of global citizenship and brought about cultural exchange. It has not only broadened my professional horizons but also deepened my commitment to global health equity. I am grateful for the experiences, skills, and relationships that this fellowship has provided, and I am excited to carry forward the lessons learned to make a lasting impact in the field of global health in my own country, Zambia.”

A report on sexual and reproductive health rights for women and girls with disabilities in Ghana, including analysis of monitoring and evaluation tools for an ongoing project (Cape Coast, Ghana)

Exploration of an intervention integrating mentor mothers with weekly SMS reminders to improve outcomes for HIV-positive pregnant women (Kabale, Uganda)

Assessment of the Integrated Palliative Outcome Scale (IPOS) in palliative care contexts (Delhi, India)

2024: Thought Leadership Through Publications


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This year, CFHI contributed to important thought leadership and discourse in global health experiential learning through a variety of publications. In February, CFHI leadership co-authored an article in the BMC Global Health Research and Policy journal titled Access, interest and equity considerations for virtual global health activities during the COVID-19 pandemic: a cross-sectional study. This piece explores the potential of virtual engagement to promote equity within global health education partnerships.

In September, CFHI leadership edited a new e-book published in Frontiers in Education titled Research and Discussions in Critical Discourses and Remedies in Global Health Education. The publication focuses on examining the history of global health education and how the field has the potential either to reinforce colonial or supremacist structures or to evolve toward a practice that aligns more closely with the intended definition of global health.



In 2024, CFHI leadership co-authored Reflection in Global Health: An Anthology, Volume 2, a compilation of reflective essays and narratives that capture personal and professional journeys essential to developing authentic and transformative insights in global health. The contents of this anthology draw from the Consortium of Universities for Global Health's annual Reflection in Global Health contest.

CFHI welcomes more than 60 scholars to global health learning experiences across nine countries and virtual platforms. This cohort is the first to benefit from CFHI's newly launched Alumni Advisor Program, which provides peer mentorship and one-on-one support to participants throughout their experience.

CFHI's Board of Directors welcomes its first two members from the Global Team and Central Leadership Team to the Board, thanks to the Team Representatives on the Board initiative.

CFHI co-sponsors the publication of Reflection in Global Health: An Anthology, Volume 2, a compilation of reflective essays and expressions that capture personal and professional journeys essential to developing authentic and transformative insights in global health.

CFHI Global Medical Director Dr. Jessica Evert co-authors a publication in the BMC Global Health Research and Policy journal titled Access, interest and equity considerations for virtual global health activities during the COVID-19 pandemic: a cross-sectional study, highlighting the need to address accessibility, power dynamics, and structural barriers for equitable participation.

CFHI introduces a new pre-departure training module for faculty leaders, developed with SASSIE Consulting, to strengthen health and safety protocols, risk mitigation, and incident response.

CFHI launches a new module in the Pillars of Global Health online curriculum, titled Health Systems. This completes a total of eight modules, all of which are required pre-departure training for CFHI program participants and are also used as standalone training at several universities and colleges.



Faculty from Ghana, Costa Rica, Jordan, Ethiopia, and the United States lead interprofessional discussions on global health systems, equity, and culturally grounded care.

CFHI's Carlos Giavay Waiss and Dr. Jessica Evert present at the annual summit of the Community-Based Global Learning Collaborative, sharing CFHI's Fair Trade Learning framework and approaches to ethical partnerships.

CFHI Medical Director in Quito, Dr. Susana Alvear, is named Woman Family Physician of the Year 2024 by the Confederación Iberoamericana de Medicina Familiar.

CFHI announces the Friends of the Philippines Scholarship Fund, generously supported by a CFHI alumni donor, which will provide full scholarships for at least six trainees from The Philippines and elsewhere in 2025.

CFHI closes the year having supported 698 global health learners and awarding over \$50,000 in scholarships across virtual and place-based programs. CFHI expands peer support, strengthens partnerships, and deepens global collaboration.

CFHI is named a finalist for the GoAbroad Innovation Awards for its Virtual Global Health Elective and receives the 2024 Platinum Seal of Transparency from Candid (GuideStar).

BOLIVIA



My month in La Paz was an unforgettable experience that I will cherish for the rest of my life. From a clinical standpoint, I was able to witness a number of interesting pediatric cases and observe how high-quality care is delivered in a low-resource setting, while growing in my clinical knowledge and cultural understanding of different views on healthcare. From a cultural standpoint, our tours with Beto to Isla del Sol on Lake Titicaca and Salar de Uyuni, the Siloli Desert, Laguna Colorada, Alasitas, and the folklore museum, along with experiencing Carnaval in La Paz and the El Clásico fútbol game, offered a truly immersive cultural experience that I will never forget.”

CFHI's academic partnerships provide universities with flexible global health programs, whether custom, semi-custom, or integrated into ongoing offerings, with curricula co-designed to align with institutional competencies.

In 2024, CFHI collaborated with universities to implement 25 customized and semi-customized programs, each designed to reflect institutional learning outcomes and global health competencies

Programs varied in length, thematic focus, and structure, while maintaining an emphasis on ethical engagement and intercultural learning. This year, we are highlighting three collaborations that illustrate the diversity, adaptability, and innovation that define CFHI's academic partnerships.



Featured CFHI Academic Partner Programs

Hunter College – Nursing in Cape Town

In partnership with Hunter College, CFHI hosted 12 nursing and nurse practitioner students and one faculty member in Cape Town, South Africa. The 2-week program emphasized clinical shadowing in local health facilities and included excursions to better understand the community context. Students observed patient care alongside South African health professionals while also participating in cultural activities, building intercultural skills, and deepening their perspectives on nursing practice in diverse healthcare settings.

University of Dayton – Global Health in Cape Coast

CFHI collaborated with the University of Dayton to deliver a 2-week undergraduate program in Cape Coast, Ghana, for 11 students and a faculty member. Participants engaged in daily clinical shadowing at Cape Coast Teaching Hospital, including outpatient clinics, ward consultations, and clinical meetings. The program integrated reflection sessions led by faculty member Laurel Monnig, lectures on Ghana's healthcare system, and opportunities to meet with local NGOs.

University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) – Global Health in Oaxaca and La Paz

CFHI partnered with UCLA to host 17 undergraduate students for an 8-week hybrid program across Oaxaca, Mexico, and La Paz, Bolivia. Students rotated through a variety of clinical settings, gaining exposure to different models of healthcare delivery while dedicating one day per week to their UCLA-led curriculum delivered virtually. This innovative design constituted a hybrid model, balancing immersive, in-country learning without faculty physically present, while maintaining academic continuity and reflection through virtual connection to the home campus.

Community Health Grants and Professional Development Grants

In 2024, CFHI allocated \$15,553 in Community Health and Professional Development Grants, supporting our global team and partners across six countries. These grants reflect CFHI's commitment to strengthening locally led initiatives while also investing in the professional growth of our teams. Each proposal demonstrates the meaningful work CFHI teams are doing within their own communities, addressing local health challenges, advancing equity, and creating opportunities for collaboration and learning that benefit both communities and future global health leaders. 2024 Community Health Project Highlights



Revitalization of the Seeta-Nazigo Youth Corner

Led by Allan Saul Namanda, CFHI Local Coordinator; Mukono, Uganda


This initiative delivered essential health education and personal development opportunities for youth in Mukono District. The program began with interactive lessons in two primary schools, forming pilot groups of approximately 30 students each. Lessons focused on youth empowerment, healthy relationships, and goal setting, using games and discussion-based activities to promote engagement. The program culminated in a youth-led World AIDS Day event attended by more than 2,000 community members. Youth led planning, preparation, and performances in dance, music, sports, and theater to spread health messages. Free medical services were provided, including HIV testing, cancer screening, malaria and STI treatment, and nutrition counseling. The event partnered with more than ten organizations and the Mukono District Health Office. The project continues through ongoing school-based youth groups and health services at Seeta-Nazigo Health Center III.

Mobile Health Clinic for the Indigenous Batwa Community, Uganda

Led by Dr. Geoffrey Anguyo, CFHI Medical Director; Kabale, Uganda

This grant supported mobile health clinics for the Batwa, an Indigenous community displaced from their ancestral forest lands three decades ago. In its second year, the project delivered three major clinics and 15 follow-up clinics, reaching individuals with chronic conditions including HIV, diabetes, hypertension, and palliative care needs. The clinics provided essential care in an area where access is limited and also offered CFHI students meaningful learning experiences. Students engaged directly with the realities of marginalized populations and resource-limited health delivery. Reflections emphasized the resilience of the Batwa community and the importance of humility and social justice in global health practice.

2024 Community Health Project Highlights



Monitoring the Growth and Development of Children Born Premature or with Other Risk Factors at Birth, La Paz, Bolivia

Led by Dr. Cecilia Uribe, CFHI Medical Director, La Paz

This grant supported the second phase of the project focused on monitoring the development of children born prematurely or with neurological risk factors such as perinatal asphyxia, syndromes, or autism. In partnership with the Centro de Desarrollo Integral CRESCERE, the project strengthened an integrated clinic model providing continuous medical, psychological, speech, and physical therapy services. Between August 2024 and March 2025, the team provided 758 therapy sessions to children from low-income families with limited access to specialized rehabilitation. A one-week neurodevelopment evaluation campaign for children of incarcerated parents resulted in 30 new cases being enrolled. The grant expanded access and ensured holistic care for vulnerable children.

Integrative Medicine Village Clinic, Patti, Northern India

Led by Hema Pandey, CFHI Director of India Programs

This grant helped sustain the Healthy Village Clinic in Patti, which provides vital healthcare access for rural communities. The grant covered clinic rent, partial staff salaries, and transportation, enabling the team to organize health camps offering screenings, treatment, and education. These efforts strengthened community trust and neighbor-to-neighbor support. For CFHI students, on-site engagement provided firsthand insight into rural health delivery, resource limitations, and culturally grounded care. One student reflected, “Neighbors came not only for care, but to support one another.” CFHI continues seeking sustainable year-round support for this clinic.

Creating and Updating Pediatric Surgical Management and Referral Policies, Cape Town, South Africa


Led by Dr. Sharon Cox, Preceptor for CFHI Global Health in South Africa

This grant supported the development of standardized pediatric surgical management and referral guidelines for children under 13 in Cape Town. The project identified 20 high-impact conditions, including appendicitis, burns, jaundice, and inguinal pathology, and created practical guidance tailored to primary and secondary care settings. Input was provided by community physicians, health managers, and pediatric surgeons. Plans are underway to publish the guidelines on the EMguidance clinical platform. Future funding will support training workshops to encourage widespread implementation.




